Highlights of the Cherokee County Board of Education Meeting held Thursday, April 19, 2018 (Central Office)

Thank you to those Principals, Administrators, and Central Office Staff attending.

- Beginning at 6 pm, Mr. Paul Brown called the meeting to order and welcomed all present.
- Ms. Wanda Arrowood led the pledge of allegiance.
- Mr. Tim West read the mission statement.
- The agenda was accepted as presented.
- The Minutes from the March 8, 2018 regular board meeting were approved as presented.
- Mr. Brown called for public comment. There was none.
- Ms. Debra Morgan of Turner & Co. appeared before the Board and presented Cherokee County School's financial statement. During her delivery, Ms. Morgan expressed appreciation to the financial staff members who were diligent in providing all the materials needed to conduct the audit. She went on to report the audit received an unmodified opinion—which is the best possible result for this type audit; she also added there were no compliance violations and explained the decrease in CCS' net position.
- Ms. Pam Pressley presented an executive summary and application for State and Federal funding of the CTE program for fiscal year 2018/19. During her presentation Ms. Pressley explained the purpose of the CTE application for State/Federal funding. She then gave an overview of the CTE program in CCS as well as stating the goal, number of CTE classes being offered and new classes that will be available in 2018/19. Ms. Pressley went on to identify the CTE Board and then announced CTE students who qualified to participate in Regional CTE workshops. She also highlighted many of the student projects being done at each of the schools. In conclusion, she announced bonuses earned by CTE teachers who saw students earn their CTE certifications and the efforts of Ms. Teresa Hayes, the County Career Development Coordinator, and her impact on the CTE program.
 - o The application is approved.
- Dr. Jeana Conley presented the 2018/19 school year calendar for consideration.
 - The 2018/19 school year calendar is approved as presented; however, will continue to be review utilizing feedback from the District staff. There were concerns about a very late spring break and lack of teacher workdays spread throughout the year. Therefore, the beginning date of August 27 will stand; however, other items may be revised and presented to the Board at the May meeting. Staff members with comments or concerns should complete the survey they will find in their email from last week.
- Mr. Winfield Clonts presented the Financial Planning Subcommittee report. Mr. Clonts began by delivering the following information items:
 - Lawn care will be provided for Ranger School by Reid's Lawn Care at a cost of \$275 per cut.
 - Dr. Conley explained that Cherokee County Schools has entered into a collaborative agreement with the TVA, County Commissioners, Town of Murphy, and Murphy Electric Power Board to fund the installation of a bridge to span the Hiwassee River at a point near Lowe's Home Improvement thus connecting the Konehete Park ballfields to the newly opened walking trail on the opposite bank; as well as making it much safer for student participating in track to reach Konehete Park without

- running along a busy roadway. It was noted funding for this effort would be requested from the ¼ Cent Sales tax fund and CCS' portion of the overall cost is \$25,000.
- Ms. Jennifer Cable provided a report on the CEP program stating that CCS was seeking to requalify for the program. Ms. Cable went on to report that two of our schools do not presently qualify for participation in the CEP program, those being AMS and MMS. Ms. Cable stated that after performing some reviews, she believed it possible that schools currently participating in the CEP can continue in the program with the exception of AMS and MMS. AMS and MMS will need to revert back to the application process.
- Next, Mr. Clonts presented several capital projects for consideration. Those being:
 - Installation of a fire alarm system in the AHS band and shop buildings. Services to be provided by National Communications Inc. (NCI) for a cost of \$11,540 for each building.
 - Procurement of Microsoft Enrollment of Education Solutions (EES) license agreement for County wide Microsoft product license. Licensing to be provided by Softchoice Corporation at a cost of \$20,939.
 - Replacement and installation of bleachers at Peachtree School. Services to be provided by BSN
 Sports at a cost of \$639; this cost represents half of the total cost with the balance being paid for by
 the Cherokee County Recreation Department.
- Ms. Stephanie Hass appeared to present the Budget Requests and began by providing a more in-depth overview of the Financial Statement delivered by Ms. Morgan from Turner & Co. Prior to this report, Ms. Hass expressed how much hard work was put in by the Central Office financial staff as well as the finance staff of all the schools during her absence and how that hard work is reflected in the favorable results realized after the financial audit. During her overview, she explained in detail several components of the Financial Statement, to include: fund balance, general fund balance, special programs fund balance, state public schools fund balance, capital outlay fund balance, and school nutrition fund end balance as of June 30, 2017.
- Next, Ms. Hass presented budget amendment requests for consideration. Those requested amendments being:
 - State Public School Fund
 - Local Current Expense Fund
 - O Use of Article 46 1/4 Cent Sales Tax fund for:
 - Murphy Riverwalk Trail bridge agreement with TVA \$25,000
 - Federal Programs Fund
 - Capital Projects Fund
 - o Use of ½ Cent Sales Tax as approved by the Board in February and March
 - o April Use of ½ Cent Sales Tax for:

•	NCI Fire Alarm installation at AHS band building	\$11,540
•	NCI Fire Alarm installation at AHS shop building	\$11,540
•	Microsoft EES License Agreement for CCS	\$20,939
•	BSN Sports bleacher replacement at PES	\$639

- Lastly, Ms. Hass delivered an overview of the Budget Proposal presented to the County Commissioners.
- Mr. Jeff Tatham delivered the Policy Subcommittee recommendations by announcing the following policy for second reading:
 - 9115 Pregualification of Bidders for Construction Projects
 - 9120 Bidding for Construction Work
 - o The policies presented for second reading are approved.
- Next, Mr. Tatham presented the following policies for first reading:
 - 3620-R (MS) Middle School Athletic Regulatory Policy
 - 7300 Staff Responsibilities
- Dr. Conley delivered her superintendent's report. She began by stating first and foremost she would like to

congratulate the finance department for having a wonderful audit. Dr. Conley next stated that the State Superintendent, Dr. Mark Johnson will be visiting CCS Monday, April 23. He will begin his tour of CCS at 9 am at AES where he will spend time in the school and meet with our Principal of the Year, Ms. Melissa Godfrey; she added we will find out if she's received the honor of North Carolina State Principal of the Year on May 11, 2018. Dr. Conley stated that Dr. Johnson will tour AES and then visit the Early College; following this he will be speaking to the Rotary Club at Rib Country. Next, Dr. Conly informed the Board that AHS has just completed its accreditation process—she offered congratulations to Dr. Lisa Fletcher her faculty and staff and stated that the accreditation team was highly complementary of AHS and very impressed with the programs offered there. Dr. Conley stated that HDHS would be the next high school to undergo the accreditation process in May then MHS and TCEC will begin their accreditation process in the fall. She added that hopefully by 2019 all CCS graduates would graduate from an accredited high school. Dr. Conley then informed the Board that two English teachers of AHS, Jill West and Sara Beaster, have been accepted to present at the National Council of Teachers of English in Houston, TX in the fall.

- Following this, Dr. Conley reported approval of several Overnight Field trips. She announced that the AHS cheerleaders will travel to Newton, NC on July 8, 2018. She stated that while there, students will learn new cheer routines and stunts. Dr. Conley reported that also from AHS, the junior and senior class will travel to Washington, DC and Philadelphia, PA on March 14, 2019. While on this trip students will visit the US Mint and various monuments, memorials and landmarks. She then announced that the AMS 7th and 8th grade Project Discovery/Talent Search students visited the Hiwassee and Ocoee State park in Benton, TN April 17 and that while there, students received college educational development, personal growth, and individual and group leadership skills. Following this, Dr. Conley reported the MHS band and chorus will travel to Pigeon Forge on April 20, 2018 and while there students will participate in student performances (ML.1 and ML.2), apply elements of music and musical techniques in order to sing and play music with accuracy and expression. Lastly, she informed the Board that the HDEMS' 7th and 8th grades visited the Project Discovery's Outdoor Classroom at Ocoee Scenic State Park on April 17 and while there students confronted challenges, tried new things, and experience personal growth in a safe, supervised atmosphere.
- Dr. Conley next reported good news items as provided by Principals and staff:

School Health

- We had a total of 63 staff members participating in the Biggest Loser spring competition.
- o 1st Place Winner: Trina Seabolt with a 13.9% weight loss.
- o 2nd Place Winner: Margi Brownback with a 12.5% weight loss.
- o 3rd Place Winner: Niki Balzar with an 11.8% weight loss.
- o Congratulations to all our winners and participants!

AES

- Andrews Elementary raised \$290 for Special Olympics during our first round of fundraising.
 Additional fundraising is going on this week.
- Our playground improvements are underway! We've had a new play structure installed, installed new swing mats, and have spread 43,000 pounds of rubber mulch. There is still more work to be completed, including the installation of a backstop for a kickball area, the installation of a handicapped swing, and adding apple trees! We are thrilled at the makeover in progress on our playground.

MCS

- The Science Olympiad team finished first overall in the regional competition at WCU on March 14th, once again qualifying for the state competition. The Science Olympiad team is traveling to NC State University on April 20-21 to compete in the state tournament. Team members are taking part in several trial events and the opening ceremony on Friday, April 20th. The team is then participating in all 24 Science Olympiad events on Saturday, April 21st. 15 team members are making the trip to the state tournament.
- o Four middle school students qualified for All-State Chorus and will travel to the event this weekend with music teacher, Carol Moss. Staff from MCS partnered with the MC

Community Club on April 12th to pick up litter along MC Road between the community center and Hoppy Trail. On April 26th, MCS will host its PTO-Sponsored Family Math Night from 5:30-7:00. It will be a celebration of all things math, and students will earn many math prizes to use at home.

- Seventh grader, Aliya McGaha, traveled to Chattanooga to be a Junior Forecaster with Paul Barys at Channel 3 WRCB News.
- O MCS Elementary stem club meets every other Tuesday and is 24 members strong. Students are enjoying using Makey-makeys, learning to code, building structures and catapults, and designing mazes for the hexbugs. The MCS Girls on the Run team has doubled in size since our inaugural season last year and is having a blast this season! MCS is also hosting a similar program for boys this spring called Xcel 2 Fitness.
- Our third grade received recognition from IXL, an online math program, for answering 17,283 questions and achieving excellent performance on 400 third grade math skills

- 5th Grade BOB team won county competition and will compete at regionals April 24.
- Allison Prohl's DonorsChoose was funded for her project called, "Seating for Encouraging Reading and Writing"
- o MES Book Fair kicks off Monday, April 23 and will run the entire week
- Our Annual Art Show will be held in May

MHS

- Eighth grade students from Murphy Middle School and Martins Creek School attended the annual Murphy High School Move Up Day. Students learned about MHS, as well as, who their teachers will be in high school while taking a tour of the school led by National Honor Society members. Eighth grade students also heard a presentation from Laura Misner, CFNC representative, about the "world of work" and how decisions they make now will affect their futures.
- MHS is proud of the students who completed the WorkKeys assessment in February. Nine students earned platinum status, 19 earned gold status, and 31 earned silver status. Ashlyn Gentry earned platinum and made a perfect score.
- On March 7, 2018, The Archibald D. Murphey Chapter of the National Society of Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) held a reception to honor five students as Good Citizenship Award winners from each of the five participating local area high schools. The Good Citizen winners were chosen by a vote of their senior class peers for having the qualities of dependability, service, leadership and patriotism. These qualities are exemplified by truthfulness, loyalty, cooperation, courtesy, self-control and unselfish interest in family, school, community and nation. All students were presented a recognition certificate, the DAR good Citizen Pin and a wallet card from the Archibald D. Murphey Chapter DAR. Peyton was selected as the winner of the essay contest at the chapter level and given a monetary award from the Archibald D. Murphey Chapter DAR. Peyton read her essay to DAR members, families, and school counselors in attendance. Peyton was selected based on her original essay, personal profile, and transcript.
- Ellie Martin and Aubrey Clapsaddle, MHS juniors, were accepted to Governor's School.
- o The students in Mr. Andrews' class made no-bake cookies before spring break. The class will be starting work on the flower garden in the courtyard near the cafeteria within the next few weeks. The students have come a long way from the start of school and are making strides in education, social, and life skills.
- Mrs. Eller received a donation of \$95 worth of aquatic plants to set up aquariums!!! Students will begin setting up the aquariums this week with the expected delivery of the plants on Friday. Once plants become established, invertebrates will be introduced followed by vertebrates. These aquariums will allow students to take water samples, test water quality

and make necessary adjustments needed to keep the aquariums stable. Chemistry class will take water sample readings and record the data. Biology class will interpret the data, and using their knowledge for the various cycles we learn in Biology, these students will know what adjustments to make to maintain homeostasis. Students will also see photosynthesis in action with the use of these plants. The CA based company has requested photos of the classes participating in the activities to publish.

- o Mr. Jones' Civics and Economics class visited the Cherokee County courthouse and met with Superior Court Judge Bradley Letz, Assistant District Attorney John Hinesman, Sheriff Derrick Palmer, and Magistrate Josh Postell. Students also observed the Superior Court in session and learned about the judicial branch in action and the important people involved.
- Mr. Jones' Civics class is studying civil, criminal and juvenile law. As part of a series of joint/interdisciplinary classes, Ms. Eller was a guest speaker recently and discussed what it was like to be a Coroner, CSI expert and Medical Examiner since she was a Coroner in Georgia not long ago. She also discussed how investigators gather evidence in a homicide case. Also, Mr. Jones' American History II class was fortunate to have two faculty guest speakers with some personal World War II experience. Math teacher Mr. McBride spoke of his father's experience as an American pilot in German POW camp Stalag 17 during the war. Science teacher Mr. Wilson, a World War II buff, described the B-17 American aircraft flown by Mr. McBride's father and showed the students the model he had made.
